The Church of Ireland

is part of the worldwide Analican Communion which has 70 million members in 164 countries, it is church, apostolic maintaining an unbroken link with the early apostles and

drawing on the apostolic faith in its teaching and worship, it is also both a Catholic and Reformed church, and is able to trace its roots to the earliest days of Irish Christianity. The Church of Ireland has three orders of sacred ministry – Bishops, Priests and Deacons.

It has services which follow an accepted liturgical form and structure and has one prayer book – The Book of Common Prayer (2004) – plus other services authorised for use by the General Synod. The Church of Ireland tries to keep a balance in doctrine and worship between Word and Sacrament and has the Holy Communion or the Eucharist as its central act of worship.



It is one church embracing Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland and has 390,000 members – 275,000 in Northern Ireland and 129,039 in the Republic of Ireland (Census 2011).

There are two provinces, Armagh and Dublin, each with an Archbishop and has 12 dioceses, over 450 parochial units and over 500 stipendiary clergy.

It is a representative church, with each diocese electing those who will represent them at the General Synod, the 'Parliament' of the church.

The General Synod consists of the House of Bishops which has 12 members and a House of Representatives which has 216 clergy and 432 laity. There are also Diocesan Synods where representatives of the parishes meet usually once a year.

The Church of Ireland has a parochial system where decisions at local level are made by Select Vestries whose lay members are elected each Easter by the people of the parish. For more information on the Church of Ireland, lease check out the Website www.ireland.anglican.org

Our Parish



St Mary's

The Carrigaline Union of Parishes consists of a group of

people who worship in two churches:

St Mary's Church in Carrigaline (consecrated 1823) and St John's Church in Monkstown (consecrated 1832).

We are blessed in the facilities we have as a parish: the Parish Hall beside the Church in Carrigaline where a lot of our after church activities takes place, the Canon McCrea Hall in the parish school of St Mary's, Waterpark which we have full use of outside of school time.

(Both of these Halls are available to rent for events, please contact the Parish Office 021-4374045 for details.)

There is also the lovely 'Sexton's Cottage' beside the Church in Monkstown which is currently rented to a local Architectural firm, who have completely and tastefully renovated the cottage.

In Carrigaline Union, as in all Church of Ireland parishes, the Fabric, Furnishings and Finance are looked after by the Select Vestry, a group of people voted in by all registered parishioners each year (see the section on the Select Vestry written by Rowland Newenham, the current Honorary Secretary). The Rector looks after all spiritual and liturgical aspects of the parish. We are lucky to have the services of a non-stipendiary Priest, the Revd Tony Murphy and of a Diocesan Reader, Richard Dring which gives a huge boost to the liturgical and spiritual depth of the parish.

We are also blessed in the Union with excellent ecumenical relationships with the Roman Catholic parishes in both Carrigaline and Monkstown. The Parish Priest of Monkstown, Fr. Sean O'Sullivan and the Parish Priest of Carrigaline, Fr. Pat Fogarty work well with the clergy of our Union, the Revd Elaine Murray and the Revd Tony Murphy.

In the past year, we have celebrated an Ecumenical Easter
Dawn Service at the Seafront in Monkstown, a Pulpit
Exchange of all four clergy during the week of Christian
Unity in January and clergy have attended each others
churches for major services such as Confirmations,
Harvests, First Holy Communions, Nine Lessons and Carols

and so on. We hope to continue with joint initiatives in the future so as to witness together our common faith.

The rector also teaches an R.E. class on prayer to groups of 5th Year students from the Community College during the school term.

Our outreach initiatives over the past year have included a collection of unwanted Christmas gifts for the Women's Refuge in Cork, Harvest vegetables and fruits delivered to the St Vincent dePaul community in Monkstown and the Senior Citizens in Carrigaline, an Easter Egg collection for the children in the Women's Refuge in Cork.

We have also reached a hand across the continents by collecting filled Pencil Cases in our parish school and delivering via United Society (Us.) to schools in Swaziland. In the future we hope to contribute prayerfully and practically to Feed the Minds Charity initiatives. This organisation reaches out to those countries who need help in providing education for the most vulnerable in their societies.

From a social justice perspective, we as a parish successfully applied for Fair-trade Status in 2012. This means that we committed ourselves, when at all possible, to buying only fairly traded goods for use in our parish activities. In this way, we help build a fairer world.



In January 2013, we began a journey to become an Eco Congregation. This means that we look at what we are currently doing as a parish, whether we are adhering to good environmental practise and if not, planning to change our behaviour in order to live lightly on the earth. See the separate section on Eco Congregation for more details on this initiative.

In all, we have a healthy, happy parish and we thank God for the honour of being a little part of his kingdom on earth.

Standing Committee of the General Synod of the Church of Ireland, September 2007. It is the policy of the Church of Ireland to set standards for the welfare of all children sharing in its ministry with a view to protecting them from physical, sexual and emotional harm.

Each of our Youth Leaders, Sunday School teachers and Junior Choir Leaders have been Garda vetted and have completed Safe Guarding Trust training.

Our Parish has a Safe Guarding Trust Panel which consists of the Rector and two others and any incident may be reported to them. Each Church and Hall has a poster with details of the Panel and how to contact them.



Reading in Church

Reading in Church is not just about getting up to the lectern each Sunday and reading aloud some text, it is about proclaiming the word of God in time-honoured fashion in our Christian

community. We are delighted in Carrigaline Union that we have a group of people (and we are always looking for more!) who enjoy reading at the services each week. There is a Rota which means that no-one gets called upon too often. Good notice is given of when you are to read and what the particular text is so plenty of time is allowed for preparation.

In the Church of Ireland, we use the Revised Common Lectionary (RCL) which is used by most of the mainstream Christian Churches. There is a 3 year cycle and each of the lectionary years begin on the first Sunday of Advent, for instance this year, November 2013 will see Year A begin on $\mathbf{1}^{\text{st}}$ December, Advent Sunday.

Year A - 2013, 2016

Year B - 2014, 2017

Year C - 2015, 2018

The first Sunday of Advent is four Sundays prior to the Western feast day of Christmas (December 25th).

Using the RCL ties worship in a local congregation to the worship of millions of Christians around the world. Drawing from a common set of texts means that Christians will be hearing and reflecting on the same scriptures and themes. Sometimes they are even singing the same hymns! In addition, building worship around the texts of the RCL also ties local worship to that of the historic Church. Using all four readings (Old Testament, Psalm, Epistle, Gospel) develops the discipline of reading and hearing the scriptures that define the Christian faith.

It also deepens the congregation's understanding of the Church Year (and consequently the life of Christ) while also helping to set the rhythm for that year. Since the Revised Common Lectionary is drawn from a long succession of older lectionaries, using those reading in worship echoes the earlier practice of the Church.

Intercessions in Church


We pray for others because we view it as a vital part of being a Christian. The Bible consistently tells us to bring our needs and the

needs of others to God. We are told to ask, knowing that we will receive; seek, knowing that we will find; knock, knowing that the door will be opened (Luke 11:1-3) Prayer is often said to be the 'practice of the presence of God'.

We, the Church , have always seen it as our holy duty to bring the world to God in regular prayer. Intercession has always been at the centre of our public liturgies. Whether it is at Morning or Evening Prayer or at Holy Communion Services, when the Church gathers, we intercede. And so, understanding the importance of our prayer, we need to give the public practice of it our full attention. Jesus' disciples weren't too proud to ask Jesus to teach them how to pray (Matthew 6:9-13, Luke 11:1-5) We all have to learn how to make our prayers vivid and imaginative on one side, while at the same time making them useful, faithful and beautiful for God.

In the Carrigaline Union, we are lucky to have several parishioners who are willing to write and lead the intercessions on a monthly basis and as with the Readers Rota, we are always looking to expand the group. On December 7th, the rector will lead a Workshop on leading Intercessions in Church and you are very welcome to come along if this is an area you would like to grow into. The workshop will be from 10am until 12pm in St Mary's Church, Carrigaline.

We began our journey to becoming an Eco Congregation in January 2013 when we downloaded '*An Environmental Check up for your Church'* from the Eco Congregation Ireland website. At the next meeting of the Select Vestry on 7th February, those

assembled voted unanimously to support the initiative that environmental issues and caring for God's creation form part of our parish's life and mission.

This was followed immediately by a Creation themed service on Saturday 9th February. Some ideas for this service were copied from the resources available on the Eco Congregation website. The next step was informing all of the parishioners what we were doing which was achieved through the weekly pew sheet and on our parish website. We have a section called 'Green Matters' in our page on the diocesan magazine

where we let people know what has been happening and look for suggestions as to what we can do to become a greener parish. Several initiatives have come about :

- We bought new bins and began separating recyclable items.
- We stopped buying plastic cups and cutlery and began using the existing delph in the cupboard.
- ❖ We sourced `green' 100% compostable cups, plates and napkins for big events (like the Flower Festival and the Parish Fete) and these are then put into the Rectory Compost bin.
- ❖ The Rector became involved in the Parish School's Green Flag initiative. This resulted in our annual sponsored Parish/School walk joining up with An Taisce's Spring Clean initiative. All of the participants picked up rubbish as they walked. Several bags of rubbish were then collected free of charge by the local Council.
- ❖ The children brought toy tractors and ploughing equipment into church for the special Rogation Sunday Service which celebrated the planting of seeds in spring. Normally we only think about the earth in this

- way in the autumn at Harvest Time, this way we appreciate the whole cycle.
- ❖ A donkey was invited to join us for our Palm Sunday Service in Carrigaline and together with 'Billy the Donkey', the entire congregation walked out of the church, down the road, through the housing estate, into the Rectory and through the Graveyard back into the Church.
- On Easter Sunday, we joined with our sister Church in Monkstown for an Ecumenical Dawn Service which celebrated the Risen Christ out of doors by the sea.
- ❖ We had a Flower Festival at Pentecost in Carrigaline, celebrating all the wonderful diversity of flowers. The theme was 'The Fruit of the Spirit'. Plants were sold at this event and we advertised the availability of Allotments in our local community.
- The Sunday School children were all given Sunflower seeds, courtesy of Christian Aid, and a competition is underway to see who will grow the tallest Sunflower.
- ❖ A major job was done on the Rectory Garden which had been left to its own devices for many years. We began by felling some trees which were in a dangerous

state (*it is interesting to note that in the Church of Ireland, we must apply to the diocesan property committee for permission to fell trees on church land, giving good reason for felling them and committing to planting trees in their stead – a great safeguard for our tree population!*) The logs were sold within the parish to bear some of the costs of the renovation. The remainder of the logs will be used in the Rectory during the winter.

- We planted bee-friendly scrubs, hedging and fruit trees.
- ❖ The entire garden usage was revised and two separate 'Allotment' type areas were developed to grow vegetables. A composting area was set up. All of these efforts are 'bearing fruit', we have a lovely productive garden, buzzing with bees and butterflies and the Rectory family are enjoying the 'fruit of our labour'

The wider parish are also benefitting from the rejuvenated rectory garden as so far we have had a Parish Picnic and two separate BBQs one for 'adults' and one for 'teens' in the Rectory grounds.



On being a Church Musician

Will I play the piano or the organ today??

A question I often ask myself. We have such a

variety of music available to us; some is so much

more suitable for the organ and some for the piano. It is wonderful to have a choice of instruments!

The other question I ask is what will we sing this Sunday or at whichever service is involved; how do I arrive at the choice of hymns each week? It can vary. I pray, I agonise, I do a 'quick pick', I pour over suggestions on the internet or in the book connected to the readings. Sometimes the rector chooses, which is always welcome. The readings of the day, the season of the year, the type of service; all these things influence the hymn selection. I do my best to pick a mix of old and modern, well-known and not so familiar, ones the children will know from school, so that everyone can join in.

It is a challenge to get it right and we can never know how the Holy Spirit will touch people's lives through the music. Many a time I myself have been amazed at just how perfectly the hymns fit with the sermon and prayers. One of the special things about being a church musician is the opportunity to be part of many special occasions such as weddings, baptisms and funerals.

Thank you to everyone who expresses their appreciation of the music in the services each week. It is so lovely to be encouraged like that. Please talk to me if you have a favourite hymn you would like us to sing or you like a hymn in the book which we could learn. It's always good to add to our 'repertoire'. My Organ Story

About 18 years ago Arthur
Houston, our then Rector, asked
me to play the organ in
Monkstown church as there was
a vacancy, and he knew I played

the piano. He was very persuasive, and as there was nobody else, I said I'd have a go. My Mum used to play the organ in the Methodist church when she was young. I was really terrified but I told God I was doing it for Him so He better help me, and He did, and still does.

Jack Hanna gave me lots of advice as he had been a choir boy in St. Finbarrs. With the encouragement and the love of the Monkstown congregation I am still playing.

To try to overcome my nervousness I took piano lessons and they helped a little. Three years ago I started lessons in St. Finbarrs to learn how to play the pedal board. Malcolm Wisener, my tutor, is a wonderful intuitive teacher and he has helped me enormously. I still get scared but I cope better now. To prepare to choose the hymns, after service on Sunday I look up the internet for the readings for the following Sunday. I read them over a couple of times to get the theme, and then I search the hymn book for hymns that fit the theme. Gradually during the week the 4 hymns emerge from the extended list.

Hymns touch us deeply and singing is joyful, beautiful, and gives praise to God. St. Augustine said 'When one sings, one prays twice'. I am a most unlikely candidate to be playing the organ as I was never a very diligent student when I was young as my main interest was sport. I even amaze myself how much I enjoy practising now.

Chamber Choir

Because the hotel on the island was full, we stayed the night in The Waterfront Hotel in Baltimore and stuffed our faces even more with a slap-up meal in the village!



Then in May we were kindly invited to sing at the closing service of the Flower Festival in St Mary's Church,
Carrigaline. Little did we know that John Andrew had arranged for us to be

secretly filmed and a few days later we could hear and watch ourselves on facebook! In June we joined with the Choir of St Canice's Cathedral in Kilkenny to sing Choral Matins . This was a fantastic experience and it was great to meet Malcolm Proud (organist), David Forde (director) and all the other choir members who had visited us the previous year in Monkstown. We were treated to a trip up the 9th Century Round Tower which stands beside the 13th Century Cathedral. What a view from the top! A few strange aches and pains the next day however, having used muscles in our

thighs to climb up that hadn't been used for years!

Taking a well deserved break for July and August we returned to Choral Evensong in September. Carrigaline Union became an affiliated member of RSCM Ireland (Royal School of Church Music) this month which is good news for both Monkstown Chamber Choir and also the Junior Choir. It is hoped to use the resources of the RSCM to encourage and assist our understanding of Church Music in an enjoyable yet practical way. By the time you read this you will be either looking forward to joining us this evening at Harvest Festival Choral Evensong or will have enjoyed the evening!

On Tuesday 22nd October, we have been invited to sing at an Ecumenical Service of Remembrance in the Chapel of Bon Secours hospital. We really feel privileged to be asked to sing at what promises to be a touching and reflective service. While we have become accustomed to singing in cold and draughty churches, the choir have been warned that the Chapel in the Bon's is swelteringly hot, so we will not be robed for this event.

Then we have Remembrance Day Choral Evensong on 10th November in St John's. The choir are currently learning the anthem "Faith, Hope and Love" by Irish composer Ronan McDonagh, specifically for this event.

Coming up to Christmas is always a busy time for any choir.

This year we will be singing at a special Advent Choral Evensong in St John's on 8th December. Then the following Sunday we join with Passage West Folk Group to sing at a Carol Service in St Mary's Church, Marmullane, Passage West. On Friday 20th we join with other choirs to sing at the Community Carol's in St Mary's Carrigaline.

Finally on Sunday 22nd December we have what will be for the choir, parishioners and local people, the highlight of the year when we sing at the traditional and hugely popular "Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols" in St John's Church at 4pm. As it is just a few days before Christmas, this service conjures up for me all that makes this season so special. We are currently learning "*Lully*, *Lulla*, *Lullay*" by Belfast composer Philip Stopford to be sung at the Service. Afterwards, choir members will very merrily (no doubt!) kick off our heels as we enjoy tapas and vino in "Napoli" bistro in Monkstown.

Bell Ringing

It was with great delight that we once again heard the sound of the bells of St Mary's and St John's for the first time in nearly a decade. It was a tradition that had unfortunately lapsed

too long ago. Now with a Rota of enthusiastic bell ringers not a Sunday goes by without the traditional call to prayer. A bell ringer's official title is a Campanologist.

Bell ringing has a long tradition in Church life, It goes back many centuries to 400 AD to be precise, when Paulinus of Nola introduced Church bells to the Christian Church. Do you realise that someone is doing a workout while you walk into church? Triceps, biceps and lats flexing, the bell-ringer keeps a keen eye on the small, square hole cut into the wooden ceiling high above their head: The rope must not chafe! Foot on the stirrup, then a few tugs on the big rope-knot sets the bell rocking then chiming. Repeating the tugs about 300 times during five minutes tells everyone that the service is about to begin. Then it's time to gallop down the stairs, racing into church before the Rector makes her appearance from the Vestry. Bells are the largest and loudest instrument in the world, but get the rhythm wrong and there will be silence or an un-holy clatter. Learn the knack and you feel a great sense of achievement!

Anyone who is interested in joining the bell ringing team at either St Mary's Church or St John's Church would be very welcome. All it requires is to be 5 minutes early for Church.. A member of the existing team will assist any new team member and "show them the ropes"

Select Vestry's Role

The Select Vestry's role is to maintain the church buildings (and contents), halls, rectory and graveyard. It is also

responsible for finances. The Select Vestry has NO responsibility with regard to order of worship or services in general. The Select Vestry is elected annually at the Easter Vestry, which is held in the period around Easter each year. Next year (2014) the Easter Vestry will also elect the Diocesan Synod members (who represent us at Diocesan meetings) and the Parochial Nominators (whose sole responsibility if called upon is to nominate a new rector).


The structure is entirely democratic. The parishioners vote to choose the members of the Select Vestry (maximum of 18 including wardens), and they also elect the Synod members and the Nominators.


Any person over the age of 18, who is a parishioner in this parish, is entitled to serve as a Select Vestry member, Diocesan Synod member, or Parochial Nominator.

I would actively encourage anyone who is considering further involvement in the parish to allow their names to go forward for election. Please approach me if you need any guidance in making sure that correct procedure is followed.

Finance





Fair Share

This is a method of pooling of our resources in the Cork Diocese so that every church member no matter where they may live contributes an equal amount towards the ministry of the Church. This money is primarily used to pay the clergy in the Diocese. In our case as a parish almost 90% of this figure is returned to the parish to support Ministry.

Tax rebate

The state will give us 30% of what we give the church in a traceable way provided our annual giving is greater than €250 in the calendar year. We all need to consider this prayerfully to determine if we can avail of this if we are a taxpayer, and if we are in employment or receipt of a pension then it is highly likely that we are a taxpayer. This is money the parish can benefit from for very little effort. We only have to contribute €5 per week to be able to meet this, and to put this in context, if we buy one alcoholic drink a week or buy a Sunday newspaper and two daily newspapers we will exceed the threshold for a tax rebate. Also we need to remember that to run the parish from year to year the average giving has to be almost €550 per family with 200 families. This indicates we should be able to maximise this benefit.

Please consider moving to envelopes or other traceable way of contributing, and consider with envelopes that the tally is only maintained by the treasurer so it is still personal and anonymous.

Should anyone wish to contribute directly to the parish, they can do so by setting up a standing order at an interval which suits your income, either weekly, monthly, quarterly or annually. The treasurer is now ordering both weekly and monthly envelopes for 2014 and should you wish to contribute in this way, please contact the Hon. Treasurer who will ensure your envelope will be available from January 2014.

Parishioners can also lodge directly to the Unions Bank account at Bank of Ireland, Carrigaline – PLEASE CONTACT THE PARISH OFFICE FOR DETAILS OF THE BANK ACCOUNT Please ensure you include your name as a narrative in any lodgement made directly to this account so the Union can benefit from relevant tax rebate.

Fundraising vs. Regular giving

75% of our income comes from regular giving which is to be commended, with only 8% from fundraising; however we do need to consider how much work goes into fundraising for the return and maybe by giving a little more through regular

giving we can then use our fundraising for mission and outreach within our community and further.

Current position

Income for 2013 has been sufficient to meet the expenses for the period to the end of August and thank you all for your weekly and monthly contributions and hard work with this year's fundraising activities which have generated in excess of €16,000.

The expenditure in the Union will be approximately €40,000 for the remainder of the year of which 50% relates to the final quarter of the Fair Share. Income from the letting of the church hall is estimated at €2,000; the tax refund estimated at €5,000 and investment income estimated at €3,500. The balance of the income will be generated through regular planned giving, weekly plate collections and the Gift Day in November. It is essential that we all carefully and prayerfully consider our giving to ensure the Union continues to be in a position financially to deliver all the wonderful facilities and support which we are privileged to be able to offer.

Carrigaline. The group consists of pre-



Sandwich'. Many people with varied skills and ability took up important roles and helped M.U. grow to the fantastic organization it is today.

Black and white has evolved into grey due to the people I have met who have supported me in the various office positions I have held during my 38 years as an enrolled member, but I am 40 years "reaping the rewards".

- I've been a member of Mothers' Union for years. I enjoy the social and friendship side a lot and have found such help and support from the members when needed.
- I'm delighted to have been asked to write a line or two on "What it means to me to be a member of Mothers' Union" as it gives me the opportunity express my gratitude! I have learnt a lot while attending meetings and reading Families First magazine; supporting the global, national and local work which Mothers' Union does to tackle family issues while fighting poverty and injustice. But it's not just the topical subjects and actions that are attractive... As a "blow-in" two and a half years ago, I was invited by an existing member to my first meeting. I remember the welcoming atmosphere, the fascinating travel talk plus the superior and unexpected supper. The more meetings I attend, the more I appreciate the smiles, laughter and kindness which accompany a real sense of acceptance. It has made my transition into a new country and community much easier knowing that I have a ready-made surrogate friends/family network. I am

confident knowing that there's plenty of wisdom in the group to tap into when I need advice or support. It really means a lot to a newbie to be recognised and greeted by name. Thank you Mothers' Union!

- My first contact with Mothers' Union was when I was invited to special talks on trips to unusual countries. I was made feel very welcome despite not being a mother! Christian Aid week this year between Sunday 12th and Saturday 18th May utilised prayers and video clips from partner organisations in Bolivia, Kenya and Zimbabwe and had as its central themes social justice and the dignity of work and self sufficiency. Whilst the social injustices of land dispossession, hunger in a world of plenty and drought are never far from our television screens, it is uplifting to realise that through our prayers, intercessions and giving - time, political action, talents and financially – that we can support those with needs here and abroad and live out our gospel calling. The collections for Christian Aid week this year's raised € 510.00. On Saturday 7th September, nearly 150 supporters undertook one of the two routes for the Sheep's Head walk to raise funds for the **Christian Aid Syria Crisis Appeal**. Christian Aid's South-West Ireland Coordinator writes:

"Cork Since the conflict in Syria began in March 2011, more than 100,000 people have been killed, over two million refugees have fled to neighbouring countries and at least another five million people have been displaced inside Syria. The number of vulnerable people is increasing as the humanitarian crisis deepens. There was close to 150 walkers who participated in either of the two scenic walk routes this year – a 14km (4.5-hr) walk and a 7km (2.5 hour) flat terrain walk, which catered for age groups, all level of walkers fitness, families, and experienced hikers, etc., and which was enjoyed by all concerned. I would express all the leaders and supporters who were hike leaders or who helped so much with catering in the hall. Specifically like to express appreciation to the parish Kilmocomogue, Canon Willoughby, Rev. Anne Skuse and Sandra Dukelow, for their wonderful support of this annual event.

Finally this is a major fundraising event for the work of Christian Aid and all funds raise on the day will go towards Christian Aid partners in the development world. We would hope to raise over €5,000 again this year and appreciate donations in reaching that target.
